The following year-end note was just received from Dee Dougil and was sent out to the animal welfare network. It highlights some of the tremendous work being done and now being shared with you. Dee writes: "First and foremost, a huge thanks to Norma Provencio for taking the time to keep track of all the animals coming through our 'pet network' this past year (2013).

Please note that my first totals I sent out around the holidays were incorrect because after a computer crash I had to use an older computer for a few months, and a significant amount of the totals were on the older computer which I forgot to use in my end-of-the- year calculations. Here is the correct total of animals coming through our "pet network" for 2013: Total: 1,213 Animals.

Breakdown: 977 Dogs, 185 Cats and 41 Other. Resolved: 490 Thank you to all of you who receive and forward our 'pet network' messages, you are helping to make a difference for the animals of this community. This is really a historical momentum because never before in the history of this valley have so many taken an interest in saving the thousands of animals that die at our shelter each year, or those that are just abandoned or dumped. Please join us in telling others how important it is to spay/neuter your animals, and to get them microchipped as well.

And please continue to help us by forwarding our pet-related emails and posting to your personal facebook pages when you can. Have a great year!—Dee"

Dee's words of appreciation only begin to describe the broad efforts taking place. There is not room in this article for greater description of the work or listing all those involved, unfortunately.
