The Humane Society of Southern New Mexico has enlisted top notch animal abuse attorney and author Catherine Wolfe to conduct the seminar.

Wolfe brings with her an impressive career background in this area of law enforcement and prosecution and has presented material at several National Animal Control Association (NACA) Annual Conferences.

She has a dynamic personality, love of animals and dedication to correcting abuse and cruelty that should provide the "Pay It Forward" positive benefit for every community from which participants come.

Law enforcement professionals will be given priority for attendance.
